Evidence-Based Treatment Dissemination Center (EBTDC): Director, Clinician Training and Consultation, NYS Office of Mental Health, Contract, Evidence-Based Treatment Dissemination Center.

Founded in 2006 under Kimberly Hoagwood for NYS OMH, Dr. Albano developed and led the clinician training and dissemination division of EBTDC. Under Dr. Albano's leadership, the clinician training and consultation program provided biweekly, hour-long telephone consultation calls led by her team of CUCARD clinician-experts in providing support and direction to OMH community clinicians to implement evidence based care for child mental health problems. Dr. Albano worked to identify the program focus and engage expert workshop leaders (treatment developers), to develop consultation materials for program evaluation, provided training workshops in the basics of evidence based care at 10 NYS locations each of 4 years, oversaw the consultation program and trained consultants, and participated in NYS OMH central office meetings and reviews. Evaluations of this dissemination program resulted in empirical publications and continued support from NYS OMH.

Dr. Albano founded and directs CUCARD, an evidence-based treatment clinic steeped in a tripartite model of providing clinical care, educating the public and professionals, and contributing to research on anxiety and related disorders. Since its inception, CUCARD has grown to a staff of 7 full-time psychologists, 1 psychiatrist, postdoctoral fellows in psychology, externs in psychology, medical students, and psychology volunteers, along with our medical director, Dr. Moira Rynn. The clinic faculty were initially therapists and diagnosticians from the Child/Adolescent Anxiety Multimodal Study (CAMS). Since inception, CUCARD staff have developed the Coping with Anxiety through Learning and Modeling (CALM) program for early childhood, and are presently developing the Launching Emergent Adults Program (LEAP). CUCARD is entirely self-supported through patient fees and private donations and is a CUMC Faculty Practice Clinic.
